Therein they err, and in this error distance themselves from those equally blessed in material benefit but totally aware of their privilege and eager to share all they are given with those less privileged.

And so, under the most ideal of circumstances, those deprived materially at birth receive from their more affluent brothers and those materially

blessed are rewarded by sharing with brothers in need. Both profit in all ways.
